

The University of Toronto does not publish a single official “average grade” for all undergraduates admitted this year, but multiple recent sources indicate that admitted students typically have high-80s to low-90s entrance averages, with roughly half now coming in at 90% or above.

Overall entering averages

- A 75% average is the minimum required for consideration in many programs, but it is not competitive for most offers.
- Guides summarizing OUAC data and U of T admissions report that the *average* entering high-school average is usually around 88%.
- Recent analysis citing OUAC statistics notes that about 45% of new U of T students now arrive with 90%+ high-school averages.

By competitiveness of program

- For most general Arts & Science–type programs, the competitive range is in the mid- to high-80s.
- Highly competitive programs such as Engineering Science, Computer Science, and Rotman Commerce typically expect averages near or above 90%, with Engineering Science commonly listed in the 93–95% range for admitted students.
- Some admissions guides estimate that, across programs, the average GPA of admitted students corresponds to roughly the high-80s to low-90s percentage range (around 3.7+ on a 4.0 scale).

How precise can we be for “this year”?

- Public U of T sites give minimum and typical competitive ranges, but not a precise institution-wide mean for this year’s cohort.
- Third-party summaries that draw on OUAC and U of T data converge on the picture that:
 - minimum “consideration” averages \approx 75%,
 - realistic competitive averages \approx mid-80s+,
 - actual admitted-student averages cluster in the high-80s, with a large and growing share in the 90s.
